As reported in yesterday's issue of the Times of Malta Anthony Spiteri died of his injuries on Thursday afternoon at St. Luke's Hospital. Spiteri was badly injured as a result of an accident in Malta Drydocks last Tuesday.

Assistant Manager, Mr. Malcolm McLean, said Tuesday's accident, in which Spiteri fell off scaffolding into the hold of a ship in No. 5 dock, was the first fatal accident in the 'Yard since Swan Hunter took over as managing agents and Baileys' was renamed Malta Drydocks'


